The Icelandic Oasis

Einar Thorsteinn's geometric proposition for a green community in the center of Iceland June 14 – July 14



Opening: Thursday, June 14, 2007. 6pm.

In Icelandic Oasis, Simon Irgens, along with a group of architecture students from Professor Wolfram Popp and Sven Pfeiffer's studio at the Technische Universität Berlin, revisits Einar Thorsteinn's proposal to develop a new community in central Iceland.

Thorsteinn, a native of Iceland, proposes a green community to be built in the center of the country, the entirety of which has never been settled, but possesses a huge economic and ecological potential in its underground thermal springs. Thorsteinn's vision folds together several concerns pertinent to the crises in our current condition; unsettled areas should be developed in anticipation of a growing population and a global climate change.

The structures seen in the site model are representations of a logic based on five-fold symmetry. Natural shapes and forms, as Thorsteinn attests, are representations of geometric sequences that are found in leaves, sea-shells and crystals. If our built environment were created from such geometries, would thinking and living through them harmonize the relationship between the constructed and natural world?

This exhibition is an experiment in form making. It represents a thinking process that bridges geometry, architecture, urbanism, and a sense of projection that brings back a spirit of Utopia prevalent in post-war modernism.

Einar Thorsteinn has worked with Olafur Eliasson since 1996. He is a trained architect that has spent much of his career focusing on the aesthetic possibilities of mathematics. The work has granted him a position in NIAC - NASA Institute for Advanced Concepts. Thorsteinn is a pioneer within experimental architecture, and has developed a dome-cubic system, sustainable solutions and organic buildings.

Simon Irgens is an architect educated in Aarhus and Berlin. He has focused on competitions, theatre set-design and building design though his work in Plot Architects and Bjarke Ingels Group, BIG. His interest in design has also lead him to initiate various small-scale projects as magazines and exhibitions. In 2006 Simon Irgens left Copenhagen to settle in Berlin, drawn by the strong cultural and artistic scene and his wish to collaborate with Olafur Eliasson and Einar Thorsteinn.
